DISTRICT NEWS: Our new District Governor BILL STURGEON has published his Goals and Objectives for New District 515. Bill extends R.I. President Hugh Archer's theme of Enjoy Rotary and adds some ideas of his own.

1989-90 District 515 Goals and Objectives

- We will ENJOY ROTARY and develop Rotary fellowship through our programs, service projects and club events.
- We will INCREASE participation in our projects and events by asking each individual Rotarian for personal participation and involvement.
- We will DEVELOP and EXECUTE projects in all four avenues of service, making each project and event a statement of our Rotary commitment to Service Above Self.
- We will INSPIRE individual Rotarians to know more about Rotary International, the District and their own clubs through informative meetings throughout the year.
- We will SUPPORT District 515 through our personal participation at District events to achieve attendance goals of 250 at the District Assembly, 500 at the District Conference and 600 at the Foundation Dinner.

- We will INCREASE our membership by 200 new Rotarians or approximately an 8% increase in our first year of District 515.
- 7. We will EXTEND Rotary in District 515 by increasing our Rotary clubs from 31 to 34.
- We will CONTINUE our traditional support for the Rotary Foundation, contributing \$150,000 in unrestricted funds through our District 515 Foundation Dinner and through our program of having 100% Paul Harris Sustaining Members in all District 515 Clubs.
- We will ESTABLISH a Benefactor Honor Roll for the Rotary Foundation Endowment Fund and add 125 names to the Honor Roll by the 1990 District Conference.
- We will PROMOTE increased involvement in Youth Activities by establishing new Interact and Rotaract Clubs in the District and by encouraging all clubs to engage in Youth Exchange.

R.I. PRESIDENTIAL CITATION PROGRAM Despite the theme of "Enjoy Rotary", Hugh has set some serious goals for Clubs Rotary to shoot for to obtain the presidential citation. This is the first time in this writers memory that a weighted point system has been used to assess the success of the clubs achievement.

1989-90 Presidential Citation Program

Clubs are encouraged to participate in each of the 10 categories. In order to qualify for District and International recognition, clubs *must* participate in at least 5 of the 10 categories. The categories and points that can be earned are as follows:

- 1. For each *new Rotarian* added to the membership of a club: 100 pts.
- 2. For each *new or provisional club* sponsored by a Rotary Club: 1,000 pts.
- For each new Community, Vocational or International Service Project: 250 pts. For a continuing service project involving club members in fellowship and service: 100 pts. For each hour a club member works on a service project: 10 pts.
- 4. For attendance by Club President or Secretary at 1989 or 1990 District Assembly: 100 pts.
- For each member of a club selected by the District Governor to participate in a program or activity of the District Conference: 100 pts. Each member who attends the District Conference: 10 pts.
- 6. For each \$10 in *unrestricted contributions* to the Rotary Foundation: 10 pts.
- 7. For each club member who is a *benefactor* to the Rotary Foundation Endowment Fund: 50 pts.
- 8. For each club member who registers before March 1, 1990 for the 1990 R.I. Convention in Portland, Oregon: 25 pts.
- 9. For Youth Exchange program participation, each new Interact Club organized, each new Rotary Village Corps organized, each new Rotaract Club organized: 500 pts.
- For each club member participating in a World Fellowship Activity, Rotary Friendship Exchange, Inter-City Meeting, Intercountry Committee or Intercountry Contact group activity, or Pre- or Post-Convention Homestay (as guest or host), Rotary Volunteers in Action: 10 pts.

Clubs that achieve equalized total points, based upon club membership on July 1, 1989, will be recognized as follows:

- Distinguished Club Citation: A club achieving a level of 75 points per member will receive a Distinguished Club Certificate, signed by the district governor.
- Star Club Citation: The five (5) clubs achieving the district's highest per member point totals in the district will receive a Star Club Citation signed by the R.I. president and the district governor, and also a Star emblem for the club banner.





A victim of multiple sclerosis, ALLISON became involved with CCH a few years ago when she received her "canine companion" Kane, a marvelous golden retriever. Trained to perform some

89 commands, these wonderful dogs have changed and enriched the lives of their many grateful masters. And by direct demonstration, ALLISON showed some of the many ways in which Kane helps her and her family in their daily lives. With puppies raised by volunteer families before their intensive "graduate" trianing at the CCH Kennels, it's estimated that the costs amounts from \$6000 to \$10,000 per dog with the final handicapped beneficiary paying only a \$125 fee. Obviously, private and public tundraising is the only way this great program can be supported. And an inspiring and heartwarming program it is - with an ambitious expansion program across the entire country in progress.

NOTES et al.: Our many thanks to DGN BILL for managing - despite so busy a schedule - to arrange for the last two issues of the SPOKE, the most recent of which with the helpful contribution of Past. Pres. BOB. They do it so well that your editor hates to bring you back to earth with these mundane lines. Oh well, what else to expect from Past Prexies, Area Reps and a DGN.

A very knowledgeable and articulate speaker, ex-reporter PAM JONES covered a lot of ground on an important and interesting subject.






WAYNE TATMAN is touting the new member drive noting October as a membership month. Are you getting your proposals in? Go to it!

TODAY: We'll be hearing from DR. GLENN SMITH, Chancellor of the San Mateo County Junior College System. No stranger to Rotary, DR. SMITH has appeared before R.C. Rotary on a number of occasions and the fact he's back is one indication of an on-going interest in his views.

Our finemaster is expected to be DICK DODGE who won't leave you much chance to DODGE DICK.

LAST WEEK: It was Halloween and looking the part a stiff PRES. BOB called on PDG SID to inspire the chorus with erstwhile songmaster ALLEN GRUMAN leading the Pledge and BOB himself taking care of the invocation.

Another day of honors with ALLEN GRUMAN this time presenting P.H. Fellowship trappings to DON HELBUSH with wife DORIS looking on. Congratulations!

And what congratulations are in order for DGN BILL CONKLIN who received a Paul Harris pin with \underline{four} sapphires representing the number of P.H. Fellowships he has contributed. Isn't that something!

DR. ALAN BOSTWICK stepped up to pinch hit as finemaster - he never runs out of material or at least his garage doesn't - about the only competitor BFI has.

A highlight before hearing from our speaker for the day, PDG SID BERLIN presented a videotape excerpt from an RNN (Rotary News Network) report covering the Nigerian Eye Camp with very gratifying acknowledgements of not only his leadership but R.C. Rotary as well. It was also a good reminder that a second such eye camp is in the works for later this coming year and towards that end a check for \$500 was recently received from the Peninsula Sunrise Club. Isn't that great!

Back to the day's program, a report from San Mateo County Manager JOHN MALTBIE. In his first year in office, JOHN is having to use all of his substantial credentials to cope with a wide range of the financial burdens faced by S.M. County, not the least of which is the over 300 million in private and public losses experienced by the county in the quake of '89.

In addition to reporting on some of the details of those losses, MR. MALTBIE directed his remarks towards explaining some of the principle functions of county government in our present day society and, in particular, some of the more critical cost problem areas now demanding attention such as the criminal justice system and health care. The latter, for example, has now been compounded by problems of drug and alcohol abuse, teenage pregnancies and AIDS.

An interesting, enlightening though also rather disturbing picture of things as they be.

NEWS AND NOTES: In reporting on matters of earthquake relief, Past Pres. BOB says he's trying to put together a work party - not only people but materials - to build a wheel chair ramp at a quake relocated Senior Vocational Training Institute in Socuel.

This program was a great example of Rotary Vocational Service in action. Vocational awareness is one of RI's restructured policy of the recognition of the worthiness to society of all useful occupations, not just one's own or those which are pursued by Rotarians.




