It wasn't because of the 4 way test, which I sometimes forget, or to help raise money for different charities, it was because I was part of a team that had helped change the world, a change I believe for the better.

I thought of Wendy Lewis who has a dream to be a peace corp. volunteer, to go to a foreign land to help the underprivileged. Well, have I got news for you Wendy, you are already a peace corp. volunteer. Peace is the end of war, peace is a full belly, dignity, a warm house and as a Rotarian we have already brought peace to many people, and are still doing so. I had never dreamed that in my lifetime Russia would allow Rotary to become part of their lifestyle.

As a Rotarian we have given the largest private scholarships worldwide. We have helped educate over 20,000 scholars at a cost of 160 million dollars and are still doing so. Since 1980 over 700 Rotarians have served in over 42 countries. What better way to be a peace corp. volunteer on a mission, a peace seeking mission one that I pray we will live to achieve.

Ed Cadman said something I'd like to share. The Rotary theme "service above self" is really built on love and Rotarians are people who form teams of actions, its quiet men and women doing great things with no fanfare. This statement reminded me of so many of our members who do so much without even being asked. The wall is down, we now have Rotary in RUSSIA with a personal invitation of its club president to come to Moscow makes me proud to be Rotarian.

The R.I. convention left me with a feeling that as Rotarians we are able to do so much. I only hope that the feeling will stay with me and that our club strives to maintain the peace seeking mission we are on, to go forth and reach out to man kind and maybe make the difference.

She graduated from UCLA this year with a degree in Political Science, majoring in International Affairs. LISA is seeking R.I.'s approval to attend Hong Kong University as a stepping stone to a hoped for future involvement in reforming the infrastructure of China.

Quite obviously intelligent, articulate, and by her performance and activities, deserving of her award. We can all be proud of her and confident that she will indeed be an ambassador of goodwill for this country abroad.

Supported by volunteer professionals (surgeons, anesthesiologists, etc.) other assistants and workers, charitable contributions and businesses donating medical supplies, this wonderful program is presently operating on an annual budget of 1.4 million, an amount that almost seems so small in relation to the great gift of new lives they are giving to so many.

SHAWN never thought he would see the day the WALL came down, or at least not this soon. In 1984 the Cold War was in full bloom. West Berlin was a city surrounded by the Wall. It was lighted at night. They even had to put 50 yards between the guard towers and the Wall so that East Berlin guards could not escape to the West.

SHAWN studied German for 8 weeks in a small town in the Black Forest, then on to West Berlin. At the language school there were 90 students from 30 countries, just for Germany.

SHAWN saw alot of ethnic tension. Turks and other minorities were brought in at the end of WWII to work jobs the German people did not want. By 1984 jobs were scarce and there was alot of tension between locals and immigrants.

SHAWN visited East Berlin, through Check Point Charlie. People in East Germany ran the gamut of emotions. Some were desperate to get to the West, most were only curious. Many were apprehensive about losing socialism's lifetime guaranty of jobs and benefits, meager though they may be.

As a part of his trip SHAWN visited England, France, Italy, Istanbul, and Russia. His presentation showed how R.I.'s SCHOLARSHIP not only impacted the life of SHAWN, but those he came in contact with overseas.



Accessible for perhaps only five months of the year, and lacking roads or other transportation facilities, it is likely this remote and virgin land will remain unchanged for many years to come.

FLOYD admitted problems are compounded for some groups by the lack of English language skills, gangs, attracting teachers from the public sector, funding special education, and keeping minority teachers.

In the future FLOYD believes we will see a shrinking of School Districts, and even Cities. Old boundaries and local control are just too expensive. There is too much duplication of operational and program expense.

All and all FLOYD was quite positive about the future of our schools.



Our speaker was President of the San Mateo County Supervisors, TOM NOLAN. For those of you who aren't aware, TOM was a charter member of the REDWOOD SHORES CLUB, but is no longer a member.

TOM thanked Rotary for arranging a donation from the District and R.I. to open a swimming pool last summer in East Palo Alto. Our own BOB RUTHERFORD was instrumental in the effort.

TOM covered a number of subjects. He touched upon the fact the County will probably have a 2 to 3 million dollar shortfall this year, and if the State proceeds as planned, there may have to be 25 million in cuts next year.

TOM was instrumental in adopting the county ordinance regarding spaying of cats and dogs. The goal is zero mercy killings of animals. Each year the County kills about 10,000 homeless dogs and cats. This ordinance has been the subject of nationwide interest.

Bay Vision 2020 is a goal to consolidate many of the current school districts, water districts, cities, transportation districts etc. into regional entities. A theme we heard last week, the bureaucratic expense of so many local entities is just too great.

The golf course at Edgewood road looks good. The EIR should be ready in 3 to 4 months. TOM says the best thing to happen to this project is election of an avid golfer as mayor of San Francisco. It could still be years away however.

A new jail will be built in Redwood, replacing the old one on the fourth floor of the County Building. The new facility will be two times the McGuire facility and probably 10 stories tall.

A much needed health clinic is being

placed in the Fair Oaks area. Finally, TOM touched on the transportation problems of the area.

TOM sees two solutions. Extension of BART to the Airport, and extension of the rail line to downtown San Francisco (so the route is from downtown San Jose, to downtown San Francisco). There is much planning, politicking, and education necessary before this will take place.

What with 911, and a contractual obligation to have 95% of all calls respond

within 8 minutes, SHARON said the job combined skills and good luck. Their average response time is 4 minutes, but for a variety of reasons, some calls can take longer. If they exceed the 8 minute goal for 95% of the calls, there are substantial financial penalties.

SHARON indicated this company was built from the ground up. Each ambulance costs about \$100,000 with all the trimmings, and are built to their specs. When you see one of the ambulances parked anywhere, it's because statistically their computers tell them that's where it will most likely be needed. When one goes into action the rest are reshuffled for the new probabilities.

SHARON described a world which is very high tech, but subject to many human vagaries, from 20 year old drivers, to meeting budget demands of local governments, to competing for limited numbers of paramedics, to going head to head with the competition.

After all the important people have been called upon for announcements of interest and we have heard a glowing report on the success of the auction (thank you DICK HATCH and all) DOC WALL will try to get all he can from his reluctant audience as finemaster. This is his first time so be kind!

Our program today will be brought to us by LEM SUMMEY and he will introduce us to Maurice Hannigan. Mr Hannigan is a member of the State Commission on Highway Safety. He has been appointed to his position by Gov. Wilson. You know, we could use a little highway safety in this country and I'm sure Mr. Hannigan will let us know what is being done in this state.

LAST WEEK

DR. ALLEN GRUMAN started things off with our usual rousing songs and put us in the right mood. Pres. DENNIS called on visiting Rotarian Carla Anisman to lead us in the pledge and then MEL ANISMAN asked the Blessing.

Pres. DENNIS informed us that his car had been broken into and almost all the important things were stolen BUT he was able to save his gavel. That Immediately eliminated a whole bunch of people from the suspicion of car theft!

DICK HATCH made his usual Auction announcement (now history). Pres. DENNIS was asking for more bodies for "The Day of The Reader" at Hawes School on March 20th. He needs 8 more!!!!

Now it's ABE BASSETTs turn as finemaster and you would think he had something planned. He started off by asking Pres. DENNIS when he lost control of the meetings and there was a chorus of "he never had control"...\$5.. PETE HUGHES was next and was asked to help ABE put a little humor in his sermons as he had done with

his marriage vows...\$5.. RON KOSTER, ALLEN GRUMAN and FRED STRATHDEE caught his eye next as they are on the Salvation Army Board and RON was responsible for ABEs being there...\$5.. BOB BOLAND got the fine for being married the shortest time...\$5.. Then ABE lost his head....everyone else got fined \$5 because it was such a beautiful day. That ABE knows how to raise the account at the Rotary Bank.

A very timely and interesting program was presented by Dr. Larry Gerston, a professor at San Jose State. Dr. Gerston also writes for the S.J. Merc. and has many other publications. His topic for the day was Post War Relationships. There are winners and losers resulting from the conflict. This has been an historical relationship between 28 coalition members. The Iraq army has been humiliated, our high tech weapons worked effectively, the country of Kuwait has been freed and to a deeper level, this is one of the first times the U.N. has agreed on a peace plan. Syria has emerged stronger now and can threaten Hussein, The Saudi's have also emerged in a strong position.

Israel lost 3.2 billion dollars as their economy took a terrible beating and they had a 200 million dollar loss in property alone but were able to stand strong.

Here are some of the losers. King Hussein of Jordan since he picked the wrong side and the Arab partners in the coalition will never forget that he shipped war material to Iraq after the sanctions were applied. Arafat and the PLO are now isolated in the Arab world. Japan, they stood silent and provided little and this is firmly etched in the Arab mind. The U.S....We still have no energy policy that will meet the needs as we now import 50% of our oil and by the year 2000 we will be importing 75%. The Persian Gulf has 70% of the worlds oil. This makes us very vulnerable politically, economically, and militarily.

Looking at the Middle East: It is no more stable today than it was before. There are still festering border disputes today just as there were before the war. The political representation is still not resolved. More monarchies or dictatorships? The U.S. must strive for independence, we must develop a conservation policy, we must start today to develop alternatives or we will be faced with another Gulf war. When we are truly independent we can handle other countries.

NEXT WEEK

The program will be a presentation about the Middle East situation again. Mr. Leonard Koppett, a columnist and editorial writer for the Times Tribune. Always an interesting program.

Our program last week was presented by MIKE PETERSON who introduced Commissioner Maurice Hannigan of the California Highway Patrol. Com. Hannigan was raised in the area and is pleased to be in this area. The CHP has the job of protecting lives and property and has been doing this for 61 years. The greatest safety measures anyone can take is to buckle up and obey the laws. The Patrol covers 96 thousand miles of road and issues 3 million traffic citations per year. In 1934 there were 17.5 deaths per 100 million miles driven and that has now been reduced to 1.9 deaths per 100 million last year and the target for this year is 1.7 deaths. Even one is too many but it is obvious that the Patrol is working successfully. The two major factors in these deaths are DUI and no seat belt...75% of the fatalities occur on surface streets and within a short distance from home. The strong legislation passed by Sacramento has helped reduce the drunk driving arrests from 50% to 45% which may not seem like much but it makes a big difference by population. Com. Hannigan commented on the L.A. beating by stating that people shouldn't let that incident reflect on the 58,000 good peace officers within the State.

The Government changed the rules...Stanford has been billing the Government for years and they never said anything. 
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

communication. This new technology is called wireless data transmission system and is very cost effective. The new technology is expected to offer faster and less expensive transmission of data by allowing multiple users to transmit on a single cellular data channel. Further, these cellular data channels will transmit data without using any of the cellular voice channel capacity. 

PROGRAM: Our own MERLE FRUEHLING handled the introduction of Dr.

William Craig, an outstanding spokesperson for the Sequoia Union High School District. The message he brought to us was on behalf of the Business Technology Academies Program which is a partnership between public education, the federal government, and the private sector. Located at Woodside and Carlmont High Schools, the Academies provide a combination of academic and technical training in business technology and computers to 10th-12th grade students with a history of under-achievement. The relationship between school and work occurs in an enriched environment that gives students a variety of experiences with local businesses and industries. Educating the underachieving student is a dilemma of national proportions and a major focus of education in the 1990s. One thing is certain; Schools cannot do it alone. Some minority students in San Mateo County live in areas where the dropout rate exceeds seventy percent. Other students see no relationship between school and the "outside world". They stop trying. They make little or no commitment to learning, and even though they may eventually graduate, they never live up to their potential. They get by, barely. The best way to help these students is to put business/industry and education together in effective programs with planned communication and definite outcomes. Now, here's where YOU come into the picture...Mentors are needed...summer jobs are needed... The purpose of the Summer Jobs Program is to provide the students with practical, on-the-job experience related to their training. The program is primarily for students who have completed their junior year and will be entering their senior year in the fall. At school, they have developed technical skills in business technology and demonstrated proper work attitudes and habits for two years. A summer job now allows them to test their skills in a real work setting. It also provides companies with relatively inexpensive, trained workers and the opportunity to evaluate these employees for possible future positions. This is a great opportunity for us, as a Club, to get in and help! Please see MERLE for the people to talk to and get involved.

Have you asked BOB RUTHERFORD for a letter to answer? The people in Russia are waiting for your answer. Please help.


