Fiber optics are revolutionizing the communication business and will soon put copper wire out of business for Each home, in the future, will have communicating. communication center which will serve all the family needs. a newspaper to survive it will be necessary for them to become highly targeted and they will have to charge more to their subscribers. AVENUES OF SERVICE:

In 1922 the RI convention refined the "objects" of Rotary. The early versions had emphasized the "business motives" but the gradual evolvement of goals reflected concerns common to a new organization; e.g., in 1910 the first object was "to extent and develop Rotary principles by the organization of affiliating Rotary clubs throughout America." In 1912 five objects covering things as promoting the worthiness of all legitimate occupations, encouragement of high ethical standards, increasing efficiency by exchanging ideas, promoting acquaintance, and quickening the interest of each member in the public welfare and civic development were adopted.

In 1915 a sixth object was added to the club objects, "to stimulate the desire of each member to be of service to his fellow men and society in general." There were six objects until 1935 when the Mexico City Convention adopted four objects. In 1951 the convention agreed that Rotary had only one object with four parts. These parts, then, became the "four avenues of service": club, vocational, community, and international respectively.

SEPTEMBER YOUTH ACTIVITIES MONTH:

Why does Rotary set aside a special month for youth? Here's one good reason: Youth is Rotary's long-term investment in the future of the community, the nation, and the world! So, circle **September** on your calendar. This is the month when all members should appraise their work with young people. Are we helping them develop their abilities, particularly in leadership and citizenship?

Our Board has already taken steps to support youth activities by authorizing the purchase of Honor Plaques for Sequoia High School. Our Vocational Service Committee is reviewing a request from the Regional Occupational Program for scholarships to youth pursuing vocational careers and our Community Service Committee is reviewing the Adopt-a-School program. Our Youth Occupational Information committee is planning to put youth with a particular interest in touch with our members with expertise in such area of interest.



These committees give us hands-on opportunities.

Norm Fenton introduced Mr. Lauren who spoke of special problems of aged people maintaining eyesight. He told us that standard myopia, hyperopia, astigmatism are common problems which are mechanical in nature and correctable with eye glasses. More severe problems are macular degeneration (inability to focus on the center of the image before the eye), glaucoma (tunnel vision) and cataracts. Some of these diseases can be treated by medication.

Age by its very nature impacts vision. As we grow older we become light sensitive and it takes longer for us to accommodate when moving from dark to light. It is essential that medical care of the eyes be continued with the aging process. A specialty has arisen within the medical community of low vision optometry which deals with legally blind people who can be helped.

Mr. Lauren indicated that the best method of reducing deterioration of the eyes is to block out ultraviolet and infrared rays through appropriate use of sun glasses.

Dr. Norman Fenton, whom it was pointed out is the one and only physician member of the Rotary Club of Redwood City, continued medical information month by introducing Dr. John Rose. Dr. Rose talked to us about emotional and psychological problems, especially in the elderly. His major field of study is depression. He indicated that symptoms of depression generally last for a minimum of two weeks. They involve poor concentration, loss of sleep, low energy, and a feeling of hopelessness.

He offed the statistic that the highest suicide rate of any group in the United States is older white males. Makes one ponder in the middle of an economic downturn such as we are experiencing throughout the world today.

He stated that depressed people have distorted thought patterns. They continually put themselves down by filtering out positive responses and only accepting negative.

Dr. Rose stated that therapy can work in some cases and that behavior modification can help in approximately two-thirds of the people suffering the disease. A period of treatment is eight weeks in the young and three to four months with older people. He further stated there is no way to predict who will be treatable inasmuch as there are too many variables in evaluating a case.

Depression can be serious and in some situations lead to selfstarvation. It is imperative that people suffering from depression involve themselves in social experiences, mix with other people, join clubs, become productive, volunteer time.

R.I. has changed vocational service and most Rotarians don't even know it happened. R.I.'s new committee guidelines extol us to do more than the old. The new elements include:

<u>Career Development</u> - Focusing on helping people, young or old, gain the skills or retraining necessary for employment.

<u>Vocation at Work</u> - Increasing employment opportunities within the community, promoting positive relations in the work place, and encouraging fair and truthful practices with associates, employees, customers and competitors which is designed to: (1) Generate new jobs in the community; (2) Place retirees in volunteer and part-time positions; (3) Address drug and alcohol problems in the work place; (4) Promote positive employer-employee relations; (5) Apply and promote the 4-way test.

<u>Vocational Awards</u> - Recognizing members of the community who possess vocational excellence.

Our errant traveler, PP Pete Hughes, exploring the world for two months, sent a letter, if that's what it could be called, to PP Alan Bostwick. The letter was written on toilet paper. Pete also enclosed make up cards from East Germany. At last report Hughes was off to Southern Spain and Africa.

Fred Strathdee presented a check from the club to our own Les Brooks, for the Salvation Army, in the generous sum of \$1,462.50. (I think they're taking this percentage stuff a bit far, don't ya think?) Les indicated the Army is coordinating with other agencies for this Holiday season. To few resources to duplicate effort. Les advised there had been a 20% jump in business just this year.

Finemaster PP Dave Schricker was in rare form. Dave lightened the wallets of Gasparini, Summey, Dodge, Mikulic, Strathdee, Mitchell, Reinhard, Brooks, Thompson, Gruman, Martinez, Fruehling, Szpoteck, Bergler, both Durkins, Roos, MacLeod, Bulanti, Boland, Haga, Schmidt, Dafnis, and Dombeck. He picked on council woman, USC grads, Cal grads, the Salvation Army, vacationers, Educators, Sgt. at Arms, Bergler's here, Directors, and pink badgers. What a shining testament to the legal, or was that the oldest, profession. (If you think the print is too small this week perhaps the next finemaster will leave the bulletin editor alone!)

"King Richard", our own R.I. Director, Rick King, was as eloquent and moving as ever. Rick relayed how he had spoken to clubs where the prime minister of the country was president, and on one occasion, the president was King of his country. Rick indicated it was so refreshing to be in a country where democracy is at work, and a plain old nobody can be president. Pres. Steve took the ribbing in good style.

Rick spoke about the Foundation. RL's Foundation did not end with polio plus. This is the 75th anniversary. Rick described some very touching scenes from his visits to Foundation projects from Ethiopia to India. He described the eye operation where a young mother saw her children for the first time. The Foundation has 9 different types of grants, from Polis Plus, to Rotary Volunteers in Action, to Scholorships, and much more. Money is not given to governments, and every dollar is supervised. Very little money is used for administration; it goes to projects.

To become a Paul Harris Fellow a \$1,000 donation is necessary. Rick pointed out when you finish the first start one for your wife, children, parent, etc. We have several of our own members who are Fellows four and five times over. Each \$1,000 saves the life of about 4 children. 40 plus will walk and untold others will avoid disabling diseases, get fresh water, etc. Rotary International is an International service club, and no matter how much good work we do at home, we must be active in all four Avenues of Service. Rick talked about the things each and every one of have spent \$1,000 on at one time or another. (A watch, clothes, a car, vacation, and the list goes on.) Rick said every once in awhile we need to spend it on life too.

Rick suggested we make an annual commitment to the Foundation. It doesn't have to be a \$1,000. It has to be significant, and regular. The Foundation received 60 requests for \$300,000 or more last year, each a valuable project. Only 7 could be funded. That is too many requests unfunded. The Foundation is doing God's work on earth. It gives life and hope. The need is now. Somewhere a child is waiting. To him/her we can not answer tomorrow. "His name (and need) is today".

If you want more information on the Foundation, or better yet, want to know who you can give your check to, please see PP Allen Gruman or Ron Koster. If you have not started your Paul Harris Sustaining Fellowship (it only costs \$100) you should do so. If you have, and haven't contributed in a long time, why not complete it. The tax year is closing soon.

Joe interwove a tap of music and comedy highlighting the likes of Blanche Range, Sophie Tucker, Fanny Price, WC Fields, Mae West, Al Jolson, Eddy Canter, and a host of others.

In Vaudeville you started out in the local houses, and if you made it big, you played the "Palace" in New York. If you were really good you usually ended up with Zigfield, and if you became a Star, you moved on to your own revue.

In its day Vaudeville entertained 1,600,000 patrons A DAY, in thousands of Vaudeville houses. There were 12,000 actors/singers/etc. working the circuit. Too bad Sid Berlin was born too late. He seemed to know the words to every song.







PROGRAM: ELAINE ROSSI was our speaker. She was a Rotary International Scholar in 1984-5 and studied in Tunisia, where she stayed for two years, working and studying. Her first choice had been Lebanon, so she was pretty fortunate, the way it worked out. She returned in 1988 to work on a health education project there. Ms. Rossi showed us some slides of Tunisia, which featured scenes of some of the Berber villages, the Berbers being the original settlers of N. Africa. We also saw some of the Roman ruins, the ampitheaters being particlarly impressive. It's a very welathy country today, thanks largely to Habib Bourguiba, who came along in the 18th Century and got its independance from France and who also instituted universal education. Agriculture is the principal occupation today--primarily olive oil (which is exported mainly to Italy) and dates. Tunisia was forced to back Sadam Hussein, which cut off much of their funding from other nations and they've lost some tourism as a result of that action. Arabic is spoken in the home there, French in the universities. The curent gov't. is decidedly secular, and is democratically elected.

We can certainly be proud of our Rotary scholars who give so much back to us after they've received our assistance.

PROGRAM: Kathy Crossgrove introduced PERRY BLACKMON, Sequoia Counseling Services, who provided us with some interesting information about cults. These groups are different from religious groups. They are often political groups (like the Klu Klux Klan or even the Nazi movement). Members of cults are usually young people trying to make something of their lives, persons who often come from fairly rigid religious backgrounds and who seldom, if ever, question authority. Interestingly, street people are not attracted to cults, since they don't respect authority and can easily detect the con man (the cult leader). The longer they're in the cult, the harder it is for the members to be able to function as individuals in society. Blackmon has worked with over 100 of these members, often deprogramming them away from the cult. He has asked the Child Protection Agency to investigate some of them, but the cults usually put up a pretty good front. He said he would not hesitate to kidnap one of his own children from a cult, even though cults are protected by 1st Amendment rights that make that action difficult.

LAST WEEK

SID led us in "The Star Spangled Banner" to get us in shape for the new baseball season, ALLAN BOSTWICK started the Pledge for us, and MIKE RYAN gave his usual thoughtful Invocation.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: DANI reminded us about the spaghetti feed April 21 at Pete's Harbor, Dani and ROLAND HAGA jointly reminded us about the Spring Redwood City Cleanup on Sat., April 24, 8:30-12:30. ROSEMARY AZEM told us about her England visit and her successful admittance to the Kensington Rotary Club--they're "trying" to get women in the club, she reported. LESLIE COBB reminded us about the Xmas in April opportunity for club members to help with some hands-on work to assist some low-income folks in the area--for example, one woman who lives on \$9,000 a year and who needs home repairs badly. He's still accepting gifts for the auction and needs cleanup persons during the day on the 17th.

FINEMASTER: Finemaster BOB STIFF levied \$2 fines on members who forgot to wear their Rotary pins, then got down to business, fining several members for not knowing enough about the legal, educational, athletic, avocational, and origin-of-birth backgounds of our colleagues.

PROGRAM: PAULA HINZ AND NATASHA VINNICHENKO, from Geonexus Communications,

presented a program based on the communication differences between cultures, focusing on USA, Russia and Japan. Among the points they made were the following: Learning a language teaches us a lot about a culture; the Russians look negatively at successful businessmen, who are called "salaried people" rather than successful people; privacy in Russia is really an alien concept, so the Russians have no word for "privacy". A collective mentality exists in Russia, and therefore they have no words to express "individuality", a concept so important to democracy here. "That's life" becomes a heavier statement--"that's fate"---in Russia. Russians have no word for "security" (individual and national). Security means to them that they are now out of danger, while we take security more-or-less for granted. Paula pointed out that a study of Japanese and Chinese characters (in words) tells us a lot about the culture's emphasis on detail, respect for ancestors, etc. Finally, Natasha said she is pessimistic about Russia converting to a market economy and commented that human rights advocates in Russia are still often viewed as trouble makers. A very thought-provoking program, all in all.



Program: If you weren't here for CHRIS-TINE SUTHERLAND'S presentation, you missed one of the most informative programs of the year. CHRISTINE, who was introduced by LUIS LEON, is executive director of the "Shelter Network of San Mateo County".

Ponder these startling facts: 10,000 of our fellow county residents are homeless; two thirds of them are in families with children under 12; 5% of them were holding jobs—and were shocked when they became homeless, most for the first time.

Since its inception in 1987, the Shelter Network has opened four "transitional housing"sites, one of them in Redwood City. Unlike programs which only provide a meal and a bed for the night, Shelter Network provides interim housing for two to six months, with intensive counseling so that families and individuals are able to re-establish stable incomes, find jobs and permanent housing.

Funded by a combination of government appropriations along with private and corporate donations, the Shelter Network is able to assist about 1,000 persons each year.




P.D.G. BILL IS R.I. PRESIDENT'S REP AT MIDWEST DISTRICT CONFERENCE
