Dear Perc:

To assist you in gaining an insight into the Rotary Club of Redwood City, a brief summary of the history of the Club and the manner in which is functions may be helpful.

The Club has been in existence for about beventeen years. During this period of time it has engaged in many worthwhile activities. Presently only five charter members remain and less than ten have been members of the Club for fifteen years.

As you perhaps know, the Menlo Perk and San Carlos clubs were sponsored by Redwood City, many of whose members were formerly members of the Redwood City Rotary Club.

During this period of time, many fine members have come and gone. One of our outstanding members was Ray Wilson. Upon his death, his estate established the Ray Wilson Scholarship Fund by depositing the sum of \$10,000.00 in trust with the Nells Fargo Bank. Since 1955 this Fund has provided an annual \$500.00 scholarship; a like amount is contributed by the Club.

Difficulty has been experienced in the past in interesting members in projects. This may be common to many clubs as most Rotarians are active in namerous organizations. With our project to build a shelter for the Boy Scouts at their high Sierra camp and the high school student on-the-job training project proposed by the Vocational Service Committee, we may be coming out of the woods. The members have always willingly given financial support to youth and needy organizations, but we recognize that this is not really "bringing Rotary to the community".

The Club adheres to the Constitution of Rotary International and, with some modification, has adopted the standard By-Laws. Based upon changes enacted at the last convention in Los Angeles, our By-Laws are being revised to comply.

On the fourth Monday of each month, the Board of Directors ment in the evening at the home of a director. The meeting rotates between homes. All members are welcomed to attend. Agendas are planned in advance and monthly financial statements are required. An annual budget is adopted by the members and the directors adhere to it. The records of the Treasurer are audited annually. As a precaution, the Club carries liability insurance.

Directors serve for a two year term on a rotating basis to provide continuity. There are no nominations for Directors. Members vote twice using the membership rosters for selection. First to determine the eight receiving the highest number of votes and then from this group those receiving the highest vote fill the vacancies. The President and Vice President are always hold-overs if they have been on the Board for two years. The Board of Directors elect the officers of the Club.

Avenue chairmen are generally members of the Board of Directors.

In making committee assignments, all selections have been discussed with and approved by the Board of Directors. To provide continuity on committees, where possible, a person with experience and new persons have been assigned. Past presidents have been assigned to the more important committees such as Classification, Fellowship, Internal Extension, Rotary Information and Rotary Foundation. Every member in the Club has been assigned to a committee.

The secretary is a past president which is most important in providing continuity.

Annually a barbecue is held for Rotarians and their Rotaryanns. This year an additional event was held - a stag golf tournament and barbecue. At Christmas time a children's program is provided. An annual highlight is our International Understanding Week program. This year we hope to have a nationally known speaker and plan to hold the event at the new Elks building where 400 people can be accommodated. Surrounding clubs will be invited to participate.

A director is in charge of programs. All suggested programs are cleared and co-ordinated to provide interesting and appropriate speakers. In selecting speakers, the avenues of service are kept in mind. Committee members are assigned to different months and programs are usually planned several months in advance.

Four members and their Rotaryanns attended the convention in Los Angeles. At a meeting in July the President and Past President reported on the convention and showed colored slides and played the recording furnished by Nitish Laharry.

It is an honor and pleasure serving as President of the Rotary Club of Redwood City.



Re: Attendance Committee
Report

President Fran:

As you requested I am makeing a report of the attendance committee report. I have one member on my committee. Myself.

Each week at our meetings at about 1:00 PM I go to the badge box and make a note of all the badges that are not being worn. I then try to see if there are any members not wearing there badges so that they will not be marked absent if they are attending the meeting. At the end of the meeting I collect all of the bullitens that have not been taken by the members. The next day following the meeting I mark with an "X" that the member was not present. And circle the "X" when I receive a card of make up from the member.

On about the 5th of the month preceeding the previous month I recheck to see if there are any members who have not made up there attendance. It is the policy of the Redwood City Rotary club to live each member every opertunity to keep there attendance record clean. I then call personally every member that my records show that have not made up there meeting. We have found in the past that accasionally a card will be misplaced in the mail or that the visiting club does not have make up cards available. So we accept a verbal from the member that he has made up at another club. We have found that this can sometimes save a members record from not haveing 100% attendance for a long period of time.

There is little that I can offer in regard to the Cashier's job other than my own experience which certainly is not a sound basis for construction suggestions.

Being an absolute novice in the matter of handling cash, I found my first two meetings as cashier most frustrating. Hence, in addition to the procedure formerly followed, I devised a simple method which seemed to eliminate any serious confusion. The steps now used could possibly be enumerated as follows:

- 1. Get \$55.00 change from Manager Bill.
- 2. Reserve end seat at nearest table in order to quickly serve the tardy.
- 3. Arrange cash in box.
- 4. Have 5 or 6 placements of \$2.75 always ready to make quick change for \$5.00.
- 5. Set out 70 or 80 tickets in bunches of 10. Either amount less tickets remaining should indicate outstanding tickets.
- 6. Use counter which I have furnished.
- Count table settings before meeting.
- 8. Count those seated and unused settings.
- Use form appended hereto or something similar. Note reverse side for fast counting of receipts.
- 10. It should be the obligation of the waitress to collect all tickets and receive payment for tickets collected only.
- 11. Set aside \$55.00 for Manager together with the proper sum for Rotary. The remainder should correspond with meal tickets at \$2.00 each.
- 12. Remit to George Doll.

The average cashier would not require these crutches to lean on but it may be possible that there is another Rotarian as inept as I.

Report: Internal Extension

Dear President Fran:

When this committee first was formed, its idea and function was to develop new members for the Club. This was to be done by a committee of three working closely with the Chamber of Commerce and contact each new business firm that moves into the community. The object of the visit primarily was one to welcome the new man to the area and take him to the Club purely for a chance to meet other businessmen in our city. Naturally, if he liked what he was exposed to, he would then evidence some interest in the Rotary Club and in turn, the Extension Committee would then push this idea further for possibility of membership.

The next step was to call on this individual the second time and again take him to Rotary — the Club picking up the tab. If, in your opinion, he looked like a good prospect, he was seated at the head table and when you introduced him, the Club would know that this was a prospect and they in turn would show more interest in greating him after the meeting.

Another interpretation on Internal Extension is to closely work with the Classification Committee. This was to be expanded by seeing that a complete up-to-date open classification rester was properly compiled and circulated to the members. This was to be followed by notes in the Club bulletin saying what classifications were open. Another step was to assign to certain members the direct responsibility to contact the potentials in their line of business or the ones that they are closely allied with. This was

Extension Committee and the Classification Committee should work extremely close together for they have a kindred interest in developing the membership for the Club. Newspaper publicity is most essential as this develops interest in the Club by outsiders and will help to stimulate prospective new members. The Club bulletin should have each month important data of the roster that has filled and unfilled classifications and made up in a new and interesting manner. One meeting during the year when there are no visitors present and we are discussing Club policies, the need for internal extension is forceably expressed by the President and then it is followed by excellent talks by two or three of the members who seem to always be successful in obtaining the new applicants. Their approach and methods used are explained to the Club so these new ideas could be used by others. At the Board of Directors meeting, the Internal Extension Committee attend regularly so they can be advised, and have a knowledge of what is going on to the Club and how it affects their committee. There are two excellent films covering the "Fourteen Steps" as well as the film shown at the recent Rotary Institute at Foothill College that this committee could utilize in bringing the message to the rest of the Club. A member of this committee should meet with and be a part of the Peninsula Rotary Club Council for exchange of ideas and to pinpoint down through concerted action the problems and answers and through a more overall approach, which would assist in a better plan of action.
